I. Introduction

January 13, 2020 - Lecture: overview of course and plan for classes; background on criminal investigations and police practice; sources of limits on police power; the Bill of Rights and the Warren Court's "Criminal Procedure Revolution;" competing interests underlying expanding and contracting criminal procedure quarantees.

Reading: Learning Criminal Procedure, Simmons and Hutchins, Second Edition, West 2019, ("Learning Crim. Pro.") Chapters I (pp. 1-8), II (pp. 19-21), and III.

II. The Fourth Amendment

a. Scope of application of the Fourth Amendment

January 15, 2020 - dialogue: What interests are protected under the Fourth Amendment? When is a search or surveillance subject to the Fourth Amendment? What is a reasonable expectation of privacy? Lead Students: TBD.

Reading: Learning Crim. Pro., Chapter 6, "When is a search a 'Fourth Amendment search?'" Cases: Katz v. United States, 389 U.S. 347 (1967); United States v. Jones, 132 S.Ct. 945 (2012).

January 21, 2020 - dialogue: Reasonable expectations of privacy continued and application of new technologies (and old).

Lead Students: TBD.

Reading: Learning Crim. Pro., Chapter 7, "The Fourth Amendment and New Technologies." Cases: Kyllo v. United States, 533 U.S. 27 (2001); Illinois v. Caballes, 543 U.S. 405 (2005); Carpenter v. United States, 138 S. Ct. 2206 (2018).

January 22, 2020 - dialogue: Further issues regarding the application of the Fourth Amendment. Who is a state actor? Third parties, secret agents, and information sharing. Distinguishing non-content from substantive information.

Lead Students: TBD.

Reading: Learning Crim. Pro., Chapter 4, When Does The Fourth Amendment Apply? (Introduction and policy, 41-43 and section (C): State Action Requirement (pp. 45-50) (skip section on who is protected)), and Chapter 8, The Fourth Amendment and Third Parties. Case: Hoffa v. United States, 385 U.S. 293 (1966); Smith v. Maryland, 442 U.S. 735 (1979); United States v. Warshak, 631 F. 3d 266 (6th Cir. 2010).

January 27, 2020 - Lecture: Who is covered by the Fourth Amendment and extraterritorial application. Review of material covered to date. Introduction to the warrant clause and search warrant procedure. Reading: Learning Crim. Pro., Chapter 4, Who is Protected?, 43-45, and Chapter 11, Issuing and Executing a Warrant, p. 267-280 (stop at Challenging a Warrant).

b. The Warrant Requirement and the Particularity Clause.

January 29, 2020 - Dialogue on (1) probable cause requirement and *Gates* totality of the circumstances test and (2) the particularity requirement and execution of search warrants.

Lead Students: TBD.

Reading: Learning Crim. Pro., Chapter 10, Probable Cause) and Chapter 11, Issuing and Executing a Warrant,

p. 267-280 (stop at Challenging a Warrant). Cases: Illinois v. Gates, 462 U.S. 213 (1983); United States v. Heldt, 668 F. 2d 1238 (D.C. Cir. 1981) (search and seizure issues only).
