## CSU | LAW: Academic Advising and Course Registration Information

## **Basic Degree Requirements**

CSU|LAW requires 90 credit hours to earn the J.D. Per ABA requirements and our Academic Regulations, students must complete the J.D. requirements in no fewer than 24 months and no more than 84 months from the time that they begin classes at the CSU|LAW.

The Required Core Curriculum courses are: Civil Procedure, Constitutional Law, Contracts, Criminal Law, Legislation & the Regulatory State, Property, Torts and Legal Writing.

In addition, students must complete satisfactorily Evidence; a third semester course in legal writing; one upper-level writing course; one professional responsibility course; and 6 experiential skills credits (at least three of which, much be a Clinic or an Externship).

The Required Core Curriculum is completed in the first two years, whether one is full-time or part-time. Part-time students are expected to follow the course sequencing listed in the Student Handbook.

Prior to registration and to assist in planning your course schedule, you should first run a Degree Audit in CampusNet. The Degree Audit will help you to identify graduation requirements you need to complete before graduation.

### **Other Important Requirements**

Additionally, of the 90 hours required for graduation, at least 73 must be in courses other than clinics or externships and at least 68 must be in non-800 level courses in the College of Law.

Courses not satisfying the 68 credit hour requirement include all clinical and externship courses, independent legal research, credits earned for participation in Moot Court and Trial Team, credit earned for Law Review, the Journal of Law and Health, or Global Business Law Review and interdisciplinary courses whether taken as part of a joint degree program or taken as part of the student's law school program under Academic Regulation 4.7.

No student may retake courses for credit that the student has previously passed.

Of the 90 hours required for graduation, no more than 30 hours may be Distance Learning (online) courses (exceptions are in place related to synchronous courses offered remotely due to COVID-19).

All law students are required to complete six credits of experiential learning. Three of the six total credits must be in an Externship or a Clinic (see below for more information on these opportunities). The other three may be in another Externship or Clinic, or some combination of simulation courses that are designated as counting toward the experiential requirement.

#### **Bar Courses**

An additional consideration when planning your course schedule are the courses most relevant for the Uniform Bar Exam. <u>In addition to the first-year curriculum</u> and other required courses, such as Constitutional Law, Evidence, and Legal Professionalism and Ethics, the following courses are important to position yourself to pass the bar exam:

- Agency and Partnership
- Corporations
- Criminal Procedure I
- Family Law
- First Amendment
- Estates and Trusts
- Sales Article 2 of the Uniform Commercial Code
- Secured Transactions

A good rule of thumb for planning purposes is to take at least 2 bar classes per semester. Our data is clear, the more bar classes a student takes, the better they will preform on the bar exam.

In your final semester of law school, you should plan to take OBEST (the Bar Exam Strategies and Tactics course).

## **Writing Courses**

Our academic regulations require all students to take at least one Third Semester Legal Writing course and at least one Upper Level Writing course, in addition to both semesters of the first-year writing course, before graduation. The Third Semester Writing course and the Upper Level Writing course may be taken at any point before graduation.

Courses meeting these requirements are offered each semester and CampusNet will include in the course description language specifying if the course courts toward one of these requirements.

#### A Note About Independent Legal Research

Independent Legal Research counts toward the Upper Level Writing course requirement and is a popular course for those students who plan to write a Note for publication. Permission will be added for Independent Legal Research, L860, when you have returned an Authorization Form (available on the Forms page of the CSU|LAW website) signed by the faculty member supervising your project – the form can be returned to Layla Davis. You should reach out directly to the faculty member who you would like to work with. The form is available on the Records page on the CSU|LAW website.

A maximum of three semester hours of Independent Legal Research credit may be elected to count toward the J.D. degree.

#### A Note About Upper Level Writing

The course descriptions in CampusNet will indicate when a course counts toward the Upper Level Writing requirement. An Upper Level Writing course involves a significant paper on a topic related to the course.

## **Externships**

The American Bar Association requires all JD law students to complete six credits of experiential learning. At CSU|LAW, three of your six total required credits MUST be in a clinic or an externship.

The other three may be in a simulation course (usually offered in the Spring semester) approved by the Curriculum Committee as experiential learning - these include Trial Advocacy (LAW 663C), Pre-Trial Practice, Transition to Practice, Advanced Legal Research, and Negotiations (with Prof. Heyward in the summer). Additional courses may be added. Check the course description for language indicating the course counts toward the experiential learning requirement. The ABA requires you to obtain experiential learning credits as part of your JD curriculum. To graduate, you must complete six total credits of experiential learning. Three of the six credits MUST be in an externship or a clinic.

An externship is an unpaid opportunity where you work at a pre-approved site (or one you've independently proposed to the clinical faculty) and obtain course credit for the work. You also enroll in the corresponding externship course at the College of Law, supervised by our clinical faculty.

Remember, you must have completed 29 credit hours by the time you will begin an externship, and your GPA must currently be at 2.25 or above, to be eligible to enroll.

Externship are posted in cycles in CareerConnect, and you apply directly to the sites of interest. For Fall, the postings are active from February 20 – April 29. For Spring, the postings are active from September 20 – October 10. For summer, the postings are active from February 20 through March 10. This means that you must plan at least one full semester in advance for securing and enrolling in an externship.

The clinical faculty circulate to the student listserv each semester an application form for spots in the following semester's clinics. The clinical offerings include:

## **Optional Interdisciplinary Courses**

Law students are permitted to take up to 2 graduate level courses for up to a total of 8 semester hours of credit in other parts of Cleveland State University. You should consider courses that are in subject areas related to your legal interests. You must obtain permission in advance of registering for such courses from an Associate Dean. To receive credit for interdisciplinary courses, a law student must earn at least a "C", in which case the credit hours will count toward the J.D. degree but the grade will not be included in computation of the student's grade point average.

## Journals, Moot Court, Mock Trial

You must obtain special registration permission for all 800-level courses, including Law Review, Journal, Moot Court, and Mock Trial. If you are selected for a journal or a team leadership of your co-curricular should coordinate with the Administration to make sure your permissions are entered so that you may add the proper courses on CampusNet.
